Montserrat Garibay, is a **National Board Certified Teacher** and the Secretary **Treasurer for Texas AFL-CIO.** She was the Vice President for Certified Employees for Education Austin for 5 years. **Education Austin is** the union representing over 3,000 employees in the Austin

Independent School District (AISD).

She taught bilingual Pre-K for 8 years in the AISD. She was the co-founder of the University Leadership Initiative, which promotes the passage of the Federal DREAM Act and Immigration Reform.

Ms. Garibay came to the U.S. as an undocumented immigrant from Mexico and after 20 years in the U.S. she became a US Citizen in 2012. A byproduct of public schools, Ms. Garibay attended the Texas public schools and received her undergraduate degree and a Master's Degree in Curriculum and Instruction at the University of Texas at Austin.

Today, Ms. Garibay remains a fierce advocate for children and families on issues of access and equity in public education. She's also a tireless advocate with a proven track record of fighting for and working-on a broad cross section of human and civil rights ranging from race, women's rights, immigration, voter participation and labor.

Ms. Garibay is a board member of KLRU Community Advisory Board and a Board member of the City of Austin Immigrant Affairs Commission. On March 2016, she was inducted to the City of Austin's Women's Hall of Fame for breaking barriers for women and girls.







The World Peace Prize Awarding Council (WPPAC) was established to select the recipients of the World Peace Prize. Dr. Han's vision of world peace, justice, and harmony is needed now more than ever. Dr. Han has devoted his energy and organizing genius to this great mission—knowing, as President Kennedy did, "that here on earth God's work must truly be our own." (*Inaugural Address of President John F. Kennedy. January 20, 1961.*)

Barbara Flaherty, Ambassador and Corporate Manager, said: "Here in Washington it is our task and privilege to promote Dr. Han's vision throughout the USA but especially among the US Congress and US Government. We report directly to Dr. Han, as Seoul is the heart and center of the World Peace Prize Awarding Council."

World Leader and Master Planner, Rev. Dr. Han Min Su, founded the World Peace Prize in Seoul, Republic of Korea, in 1989. Dr. Han is a Presbyterian Minister.

Dr. Han's vision is one of world peace and harmony.

Dr. Han has devoted his life to this great mission—knowing, as President Kennedy did, "that here on earth God's work must truly be our own." (Inaugural Address of President John F. Kennedy. January 20, 1961).

The World Peace Prize Awarding Council (WPPAC), which is headquartered in Seoul with an office in Washington, D.C, was established to select the recipients of the World Peace Prize.

The International and Interfaith Board is composed of representatives of all the major worldwide religions: Judaism, Islam, Hinduism, Buddhism, Confucianism, Catholicism, Protestantism, Orthodox, and Zoroastrianism.

Fr. Sean Mc Manus, President of the Capitol Hill-based Irish National Caucus, and Barbara Flaherty, Executive Vice President, were awarded with the World Peace Prize of Roving Ambassador for Peace and inducted as WPPAC Judges at a Ceremony in Seoul in 2013. Fr. Mc Manus was then selected as the Chief Judge of WPPAC.

Fr. McManus explained: When we joined the World Peace Prize AwardingCouncil in 2013, we set out to accomplish TWO OBJECTIVES:

The FIRST OBJECTIVE was this: to assert the fundamental truth and basic principle, that peace is the fruit of justice—that working for peace means, in fact, working for social justice. Without justice, there is no love. No Faith. No equality. No fairness. No decency. Without justice, there is no love of God, and, certainly, no love of neighbor.

And our SECOND OBJECTIVE was this: to firmly place the American Labor Movement in the category of those who, in fact, work for peace because the Labor Movement works for justice.

If you look at America and ask the question: What group since the late 1800s has consistently worked for justice for the working men and women of America, what group comes to mind? What group has stood for equality, for solidarity, for "a just pay for a just day's work"?

Labor Leaders who spend their entire lives working in solidarity for justice for working men and women are, indeed, working for peace—not only nationally but also globally. Hence, Labor leaders are eminently qualified to be candidates for the World Peace Prize of "Roving Ambassador for Peace."

Of course, a memorable quote by Pope John Paul II, from one of his great Encyclicals helped us to make the case. Reflecting on the maxim "peace is the fruit of justice," the Pope declared: "Today, one could say, with the same exactness and the same power of biblical inspiration (cf. Isaiah 32:17; James 3:18) ... peace is the fruit of solidarity"— Encyclical, "Solicitude for social concerns." 39. 1988.

Working for peace—not only nationally but also globally. Hence, Labor leaders are eminently qualified to be candidates for the World Peace Prize of Roving Ambassador for Peace. And to further affirm this principle, in 2018 the WPPAC created a secondary prize: World Peace Prize for Labor Leadership.

Our Peace Prizes encourage members of the Labor Movement to positively think of themselves as not just fighters for justice but as peace builders as well. Our World Peace Prize for Labor Leadership, in particular, makes the connection between Labor and peace. I believe this gives an important dimension to Labor's self-understanding, self-image, and self-identity.

I urge Labor leaders to proudly claim this identity, to embrace it, and to promote it among the AFL-CIO. It is a powerful way to advance Labor and promote solidarity."





WORLD PEACE PRIZE GOES TO TEXAS WOMAN LABOR LEADER

CAPITOL HILL. Austin, Texas. —A top Texan woman Labor leader has been awarded the World Peace Prize.

Montserrat Garibay, Secretary-Treasurer, Texas AFL-CIO, was presented with the World Peace Prize of "Roving Ambassador for Peace."

The presentation ceremony took place on Monday afternoon, February 18, 2019, at the Texas AFL-CIO headquarters in Austin.

World Leader and Master Planner, Rev. Dr. Han Min Su, founded the World Peace Prize in Seoul, South Korea, in 1989. Dr. Han is a Presbyterian Minister.

The presentation was made by Fr. Sean McManus—Chief Judge of the World Peace Prize and President of the Capitol Hill-based Irish National Caucus— and the ceremony was chaired by Barbara Flaherty, a Judge of the World Peace Prize Awarding Council, and Executive Vice President of the Irish National Caucus.

The World Peace Prize Awarding Council consists of a 14-member Board of International and Interfaith judges. The Board is comprised of representatives of the world's nine major religions: Judaism, Islam, Hinduism, Buddhism, Confucianism, Catholicism, Protestantism, Russian Orthodox, and Zoroastrianism.

Fr. Mc Manus explained: "Working for peace, locally or globally, means, in effect and of necessity, working for social justice. Therefore, members of the Labor Movement are ideally qualified to be recipients of our World Peace Prize. Montserrat Garibay— originally from Mexico City, and once an undocumented immigrant, but now an American citizen—personifies the true Labor spirit and the true immigrant spirit. She has a driving desire to create justice and solidarity for all. She is an ideal recipient for the World Peace Prize of 'Roving Ambassador for Peace'—for as Pope John Paul II powerfully reminds us, peace is the fruit of solidarity."

Secretary-Treasurer Garibay in her acceptance speech expressed heartfelt appreciation for the honor of the Prize; she movingly recounted her early experience in the United States and how so many people helped her and her family to overcome difficulties. She sees her mission as Labor leader as a perfect way of "giving back"— of promoting solidarity and justice for all, with a helping hand to immigrants and all who are seeking dignity and fairness. Acceptance Speech by Montserrat Garibay on Receiving World Peace Prize of "Roving Ambassador for Peace"

First of all, thank you to Fr. Sean Mc Manus and Barbara Flaherty from the Irish Peace Foundation for presenting me with, Roving Ambassador for Peace.

Thank you to the National AFL-CIO, President Richard Trumka, Secretary Treasurer, Liz Schuler and Executive Vice President Tefere Gebre. I want to thank my mother, sister, husband for being here for always supporting me. I love you. Also, thank you to the Texas AFL-CIO staff and affiliates and everyone that is here today, it means a lot that you took time from your busy schedules to be here this afternoon.

When I got the call from Fr. Sean, I was speechless and grateful for being nominated to this beautiful recognition. The work that I do every day for the working people of Texas is done with love and commitment to ensure that every women and men in our country are treated with dignity and respect, no matter the work that they do and where they come from. We all play a very special role in our communities.

When my mother, sister and I immigrated to the US 27 years ago, we were undocumented. We were scared and sad to leave our love ones in Mexico. However, with time, we learned English, we loved living in the US, we felt free and meet many people that helped us in journey. People like Mrs. Hernandez, my ESL teacher, Patty and Michael, my mom's bosses and other friends became our guardian angels.

Time and time again they showed us compassion, kindness and love. I always admired how without really knowing us, they helped us in so many ways, whether it was helping us financially, giving us a word of advice, support or simply by giving us smile and a hug when we need it the most.

When I became a teacher in Austin ISD and a union member of Education Austin. I felt the responsibility to do the same and to give back. I committed to speak up when I saw injustice. I committed to volunteer. I committed to be a leader in my union. I committed to use my voice to help others and I committed to mentor younger people of color.

When I was teaching, I encountered many families who were separated due to our broken immigration system. Many times, I felt powerless and devastated as I saw my students as young as four years old, sad and struggling to learn because their parents where been deported or sent to jail.

That is why, when I became the vice president of Education Austin, we integrated social justice unionism to our work. We created know your rights trainings for immigrant families, DACA clinics to help dreamers get their work permit and we passed resolutions with the Austin Independent School District to make schools safe zone schools. We also helped organized many Spanish speaking members.

I have been very lucky to have amazing mentors, like Louis Malfaro, Linda Bridges, John Patrick, Rick Levy, they all have taught me to use my voice loud and clear for workers' rights.

Five years ago, I became a US citizen. This was a huge milestone in my life. I felt that more than ever, I had the responsibility to assist other legal permanents to apply to become US citizens. That is why, I decided to start organizing union led citizenship drives, we have helped over 1500 hundred people with their applications. There is nothing more special that to see a custodian, a bus driver, a teacher, a cafeteria worker become a proud US Citizen. One of the proudest campaigns that I am helping lead at the Texas AFL-CIO is our Citizenship Campaign. We have over 1.1 million eligible permanent residents in Texas. As you can see, we have a lot of work to do!

We are living critical moments in our history and in the US. Every day, I try to do my best to be a voice for the working people of Texas. More than ever, we must commit to social justice. My commitment to lift and empower others to use their voice is more vibrant that ever.

American Labor and Irish National Caucus Working Together for Justice in Ireland



Fr. Sean McManus—President of the Capital Hill-based Irish National Caucus—has had a very long on-going association with American Labor. He founded the Irish National Caucus on February 6, 1974. In February 1975, the Executive Council of the AFL-CIO invited him to Bal Harbour, Florida, to brief them on the Irish Issue. The Executive Council endorsed the Irish National Caucus. Then about ten years later, the Executive Council invited Fr. McManus to brief them on the Mac Bride Principles—a corporate code of conduct for American companies doing business in Northern Ireland. The AFL-CIO became the first significant group to endorse the Mac Bride Principles.

President Trumka, Tefera Gebre, Liz Powell and John Sweeney have each been awarded with the World Peace Prize of "Roving Ambassador for Peace" by Fr. McManus—who is also Chief Judge of the international and interfaith World Peace Prize (headquartered in Seoul, South Korea). President Trumka also received the new World Peace Prize for LABOR LEADERSHIP on June 19, 2018



THE IRISH LOBBY

The Irish National Caucus (INC) is the Irish lobby on Capitol Hill, Washington, D.C. It is a human rights organization dedicated to getting the United States to stand up for justice and peace in Ireland.

NONPROFIT

The Irish National Caucus is a nonprofit organization (registered in Washington, D.C., 1978). It is 501(c) (4). The INC's sister organization, the Irish Peace Foundation, is recognized by the I.R.S. as being eligible to receive tax-deductible contributions under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3).

NONVIOLENT

The Irish National Caucus is nonviolent, nonpartisan and nonsectarian. It has no foreign principal and does not support, morally or financially, any group or party in any part of Ireland. It does not send money to Ireland. All its funds are raised and spent in the United States.

HISTORIC VISION

The Irish National Caucus was the first organization in history to open and maintain headquarters on Capitol Hill to lobby for justice and peace in Ireland. That fact alone tells you a lot about the vision and purpose of the Irish National Caucus – not to mention its determination and ability. And so began a historic development: "Thus Mc Manus became Britain's nemesis in America, the driving force that would eventually erode Britain's influence within the U.S. Government."
