

ELIZABETH "LIZ" POWELL

Secretary-Treasurer

American Postal Workers Union, AFL-CIO

Liz joined the United States Postal Service in 1970 as a part time flexible clerk, working at the Hempstead, NY Post Office on Long Island while at the same time working as a Teacher's Aide for the Hempstead School District. She became actively involved in the Hempstead Local APWU early in her postal career, serving as Chief Shop Steward and Secretary-Treasurer. In 1979 she was elected as the first female president of the Hempstead APWU Local, now known as the Western Nassau, NY Area Local. She held that position until 1983 when she became one of the first two women to be elected as a full-time National Business Agent, New York Region, Clerk Division for the American Postal Workers Union, AFL-CIO.

Liz served the membership as a National Business Agent from 1983 until 1989, when she was elected as the first and only female member of the APWU National Executive Board as the Regional Coordinator, Northeast Region, representing Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Puerto Rico, Rhode Island, Vermont and the U.S. Virgin Islands.

On October 16, 2009, she was appointed by APWU President William Burrus, and approved by a vote of the National Executive Board, in accordance with the APWU Constitution, to serve as the union's national Secretary-Treasurer, making her the first woman executive officer in the union's history. In the 2010, 2013, 2016, 2019 and 2022 National Officer's Election, she was elected to serve three-year terms as Secretary-Treasurer of the American Postal Workers Union, AFL-CIO.

Liz believes that the membership is the most important faction within the APWU and has consistently extended herself to provide the state and local unions any and all of the assistance necessary to give maximum representation. Education and information are a top priority with her and is shared with all state and local officers through mailings and seminars.

In 1979, POWER (Post Office Women for Equal Rights) was formed. Liz served as one of the founding members, and has continued to support women issues within the APWU as well as within the Labor Movement. At the APWU POWER 18th Biennial Convention, held August 18-21, 2005 in New Orleans, LA, APWU President William Burrus paid a special tribute to Liz, by announcing that an Elizabeth "Liz" Powell Executive Award will be presented at future APWU POWER Conventions. Liz has received numerous awards including the 2011 APWU POWER Glass Ceiling Award, the 2012 National CBTU Addie Wyatt Award and the 2017 CBTU Award of Distinction, the 2013 National Coalition of Black Civic Participation, BWR - Black Women's Roundtable Phenomenal Woman, Social Justice Trailblazer Award and the 2017 Spirit of Democracy Leadership Award. In March 2014, she was presented with CLUW's Olga Madar Leadership Award. Liz is an active participant of all of those organizations as well as several others including APRI – A Phillip Randolph Institute, where in August 2014 she received the Rosina Tucker Labor Pioneer Award and was one of NAN's 2016 MLK Breakfast honorees where she received the Breaking the Barrier Award. In February 2017 the Irish National Caucus honored her with the "Roving Ambassador for World Peace" Award and in February 2019 they honored her with the "World Peace Prize for Labor Leadership". At the 2018 AFL MLK Gala she received the "At the River I Stand" award. In November 2019 the UFCW Minority Coalition presented Liz with an Addie Wyatt award and on July 27, 2020, The Summit for Civil Rights presented Liz with the "2020 Shirley Chisholm" Breakthrough Leader" Award. In November 2020, Liz was honored by the American Labor Museum for her notable contributions, which have improved the lives of working people by presenting her with the Sol Stetin Award. Liz has gone to Lisbon, Portugal; Montreal, Canada; Rio de Janeiro, and Chicago, to participate with the UNI World Women's Committee (Union Network International).

As an only child, Liz was born in the coal-mining state of West Virginia and graduated as Salutatorian of her class at Aracoma High School in Logan, West Virginia where she received a scholarship and attended West Virginia State College. She is the mother of Robert (deceased), Barbara, Renee and Greg and is the proud grandmother of Patrick, Greg Jr., Aaliyah, Eddie and John Michael and the proud great grandmother of Eli.

She believes that "A Woman's Place is in Her Union" and "In Unity There is Strength, and Together We Can and Will Meet the Challenges of Tomorrow".



DR. EVERETT B. KELLEY
Preacher / Teacher / Community Leader/Author
"I can do all things through Christ who strengths me."

A man after God's own heart, Dr. Everett Kelley is an anointed preacher, teacher, and community leader who knew as early as age six what his calling in life was. With personal conviction and perpetual confirmation as his guide, Dr. Kelley has humbly allowed God to use his life in service to the country, the Kingdom and the community.

As a Kingdom servant, Dr. Kelley rededicated himself to ministry at Greater New Hope Baptist Church in Sylacauga, Alabama where he served from 1982 to 1987. Later in 1987, Dr. Kelley transitioned in ministry from Greater New Hope to St. Mary Missionary Baptist Church in Lincoln, Alabama. In 1987, Dr. Kelley was appointed pastor of St. Mary Missionary Baptist Church; a position he held for 311/2 years before retiring in February 2019 and being appointed Pastor Emeritus.

Because of his commitment to winning souls for Christ, seeing marriages restored, families healed, and other generations rise up in greatness, Dr. Kelley became well known for his unique way of delivering God's Word by drawing from his own failures and shortcomings. It was this unique relationship with God's Word that made Dr. Kelley an effective instructor at Rushing Springs School of Theology and an admired instructor of Christian Education & Evangelism at Birmingham Estonian Bible College.

As a military veteran, Dr. Kelley served in the United States Army for three years. As an entrepreneur and one who takes seriously his responsibility to operate in the multiple gifts God has placed in him, Dr. Kelley founded B & K Cabinets in Sylacauga, Alabama, K & G Cabinets in Oxford, Alabama, and is also the President & CEO of E. B. Kelley Ministries LLC, which has extended subsidiaries. With a passion for people and a desire to make a difference, Dr. Kelley founded Project Hope Outreach Ministries Inc.; an organization designed to provide direct services to the underserved.

Having established himself as a relevant and strategic leader, in March 2020 Dr. Kelley's ascension to the office of President of American Federation of Government Employees came as no surprise. Dr. Kelley was elected to the position of National Secretary Treasurer of American Federation of Government Employees (AFGE) in August 2018. Prior to this distinguished appointment, Dr. Kelley served as National Vice President of AFGE District 5 for seven years where he grew the membership from 38000 members to over 51,000 members.

Rooted in an obligation to community service that extends over three decades, Dr. Kelley currently holds board memberships with Habitat for Humanity and Coalition of Black Trade Unionist and is a present member of the Labor Roundtable. Dr. Kelley is also a former board member of the Supervisory Committee of the AOD Federal Credit Union and AUSA. He was formerly appointed to the Calhoun County Economic Development Council as well as the East Alabama Planning Board.


Dr. Kelley attended Central Alabama Community College, Selma University and earned a Bachelor of Theology and Master of Theology from Rushing Spring School of Theology. He also

earned a Doctor of Philosophy in Christian Counseling and received an honorary Doctor of Divinity at St. Thomas Christian University in Jacksonville, Florida.

EXCERPT FROM FR. MC MANUS' OPENING ADDRESS

"...We were able to make the connection between American Organized Labor and the World Peace Prize because, you see, all major religions in the world believe that love of God and love of neighbor is the same commandment—and because the love of neighbor means, in effect, doing justice and building up God's kingdom on this earth. The famous American Protestant Scripture Scholar, Rev. Walter Brueggemann, puts it very clearly: "In Biblical faith, the doing of justice is the primary expectation of God."

And, of course, Jesus Christ, Himself, makes that crystal clear when He told us: "In so far as you did it to the least of my brothers and sisters, you did it to me." No more powerful statement has ever been made.

Faith is the faith that does justice. There is no other faith. If it does not do justice, it is not faith—not the Jewish faith, not the Christian faith, not the Muslim faith, not any faith.

And the wonderful thing about putting justice at the core and center of everything is that people of no faith but of goodwill can also agree in principle with this. And that's very important....

... In 1988, there was a dramatic emphasis on the theology/ social philosophy of the term "SOLIDARITY."

Pope John Paul II issued a remarkable and powerful Encyclical, "Solicitude for Social Concerns," also known as the Solidarity Encyclical.

In it he reflects on the maxim "peace is the fruit of justice," and states:

"Today, one could say, with the same exactness and the same power of Biblical Inspiration (cf. Isaiah 32:17; James 3:18) ... peace is the fruit of solidarity"— Encyclical, "Solicitude on social concerns." 39. 1988.

The Pope raised solidarity to a virtue ...

... This explanation of the history and significance of the "Richard L. Trumka World Peace Prize for Solidarity"— in and of itself—also explains why Secretary-Treasurer Powell and National President Kelly are today the recipients of this Prize: Because they personify the President Trumka-spirit: of solidarity, determination, and dedication to the Union—and a lifelong commitment to social and economic justice for American working women and men, and, indeed, for all people locally, nationally, and globally.

Finally, let me mention this: In further honor and memory of President Trumka, the World Peace Prize now refers to American Organized Labor as "Organized Love of Neighbor."

World Leader and Master Planner, the late Rev. Dr. Han Min Su, founded the World Peace Prize in Seoul, Republic of Korea, in 1989. Dr. Han was a Presbyterian Minister.

Dr. Han's vision was one of world peace and harmony.

Dr. Han had devoted his life to this great mission—knowing, as President Kennedy did, "that here on earth God's work must truly be our own." (Inaugural Address of President John F. Kennedy. January 20, 1961).

The World Peace Prize Awarding Council (WPPAC), which is headquartered in Seoul with an office in Washington, D.C, was established to select the recipients of the World Peace Prize.

The International and Interfaith Board is composed of representatives of all the major worldwide religions: Judaism, Islam, Hinduism, Buddhism, Confucianism, Catholicism, Protestantism, Orthodox, and Zoroastrianism.

Fr. Sean Mc Manus, President of the Capitol Hill-based Irish National Caucus, and Barbara Flaherty, Executive Vice President, were awarded with the World Peace Prize of Roving Ambassador for Peace and inducted as WPPAC Judges at a Ceremony in Seoul in 2013. Fr. Mc Manus was then selected as the Chief Judge of WPPAC.

Fr. McManus explained: When we joined the World Peace Prize Awarding Council in 2013, we set out to accomplish TWO OBJECTIVES: The FIRST OBJECTIVE was this: to assert the fundamental truth and basic principle, that peace is the fruit of justice—that working for peace means, in fact, working for social justice. Without justice, there is no love. No Faith. No equality. No fairness. No decency. Without justice, there is no love of God, and, certainly, no love of neighbor.

And our SECOND OBJECTIVE was this: to firmly place the American Labor Movement in the category of those who, in fact, work for peace because the Labor Movement works for justice.

If you look at America and ask the question: What group since the late 1800s has consistently worked for justice for the working men and women of America, what group comes to mind? What group has stood for equality, for solidarity, for "a just pay for a just day's work"?

Labor Leaders who spend their entire lives working in solidarity for justice for working men and women are, indeed, working for peace—not only nationally but also globally. Hence, Labor leaders are eminently qualified to be candidates for the World Peace Prize of "Roving Ambassador for Peace."

Of course, a memorable quote by Pope John Paul II, from one of his great Encyclicals helped us to make the case. Reflecting on the maxim "peace is the fruit of justice," the Pope declared: "Today, one could say, with the same exactness and the same power of biblical inspiration (cf. Isaiah 32:17; James 3:18) ... peace is the fruit of solidarity"— Encyclical, "Solicitude for social concerns." 39. 1988.

Working for peace—not only nationally but also globally. Hence, Labor leaders are eminently qualified to be candidates for the World Peace Prize of Roving Ambassador for Peace. And to further affirm this principle, in 2018 the WPPAC created a secondary prize: World Peace Prize for Labor Leadership.

Our Peace Prizes encourage members of the Labor Movement to positively think of themselves as not just fighters for justice but as peace builders as well. Our World Peace Prize for Labor Leadership, in particular, makes the connection between Labor and peace. I believe this gives an important dimension to Labor's self-understanding, self-image, and self-identity.

I urge Labor leaders to proudly claim this identity, to embrace it, and to promote it among the AFL-CIO. It is a powerful way to advance Labor and promote solidarity."



Fr. Sean McManus—President of the Capital Hill-based Irish National Caucus—has had a very long on-going association with American Labor. He founded the Irish National Caucus on February 6, 1974. In February 1975, the Executive Council of the AFL-CIO invited him to Bal Harbour, Florida, to brief them on the Irish Issue. The Executive Council endorsed the Irish National Caucus. Then about ten years later, the Executive Council invited Fr. McManus to brief them on the Mac Bride Principles—a corporate code of conduct for American companies doing business in Northern Ireland. The AFL-CIO became the first significant group to endorse the Mac Bride Principles.

President Trumka, Tefera Gebre, Liz Powell and John Sweeney have each been awarded with the World Peace Prize of "Roving Ambassador for Peace" by Fr. McManus—who is also Chief Judge of the international and interfaith World Peace Prize (headquartered in Seoul, South Korea). President Trumka also received the new World Peace Prize for LABOR LEADERSHIP on June 19, 2018
